










Southern Vermont College Library (Bennington) held a "Fill the Jar" contest to explore how students feel about research.

Financed by an annual grant from the Vermont Department of Libraries and operated by VLS librarians and staff, CLIC offers free legal reference services for the general public:

LexisAdvance, legal databases containing primary (court decisions, statutes, and regulations) and secondary (encyclopedias, treatises, and dictionaries) sources.

Willard Sterne Randall

New York Times best-selling biographer and historian

Willard Sterne Randall cut his teeth on his father's copy of Kenneth Roberts' *Rabble in Arms* and several other of the Maine-born journalist-turned-novelist's classic studies of the Revolutionary War era. Like Roberts, Randall left behind a career as a successful investigative journalist to unearth



the facts about the most controversial figure in the Founding Era, Benedict Arnold. Roberts broke new ground as an historical novelist; Randall chose the path of historical nonfiction as he explored many of the same events, characters and terrain to produce *Benedict Arnold, Patriot and Traitor*, a 1990 Notable Book of the New York Times. Both became fascinated by Arnold's exploits on Lake Champlain. How do their accounts compare and contrast?

Before the lecture join a discussion of *Rabble in Arms* at Mount Independence Historic Site on Saturday, June 9th at 12:30 p.m. We suggest you read *Benedict Arnold*, *Patriot and Traitor* prior to the talk and discussion -- though it is not required to attend.
