



- Adoption rate is slowing [1.5 yrs for last 1%]


The mashup: Iowa libraries with hotspots. Clickable map. Built with mapbuilder, for free.





Do You Know This Face? The Smithsonian Needs Help Identifying These Women Scientists



Each March, the Smithsonian Institution Archives celebrates Women's History Month by posting historical photographs of female scientists, science journalists and engineers to a Flickr Commons album. Taken from the 1910s to 1960s, the portraits capture many women who were pioneers in their fields. But for a number of the photographs, however, there is little in terms of caption information identifying the women.

The women are pictured at their desks with microscopes, botanical illustrations or jarred specimens; standing at chalkboards displaying graphs and equations; and in labs tending to test tubes, beakers and petri dishes. A few are scraping away at archaeological sites.


Do you want to share your own personal life stories, or read about others in your community? The County of Brant Public Library has introduced

- Add your personal memories about any place, person, or organization with an article.




